"COME AND SEE!"

"He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay."
(Matthew 28:6)

Sharing good news is exciting business. New parents can share the happy news with loved ones: "It's a girl!" or "It's a boy!" Friends can shock one another with a well kept secret birthday party: "Surprise!" High school seniors wait for the good news from a college: "You have been accepted." Even adults want to hear good news in the form of those sweet words from a boss: "We're giving you a raise." When there's good news, we can be happy to share it—even if we're not on the receiving end of the message.

That thought makes me consider the work of the angels in the life of Christ. When Jesus was born in the little *burg* of Bethlehem, there were shepherds keeping watch over their fields by night. Who appeared to them? Angels did! They brought good news of great joy: Go to

Bethlehem and see "a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger" (Luke 2:12). They pointed to the place where he lay, as a small baby boy all wrapped up.

On that first Easter morning, angels were there again. Angels are God's messengers, ministering spirits of the Almighty. At the empty tomb of Jesus they shared another message, rich with good news from beginning to end: "Jesus is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay." The angels pointed to the place where Jesus lay. But this time the Lord Jesus was not wrapped in cloths and he was not resting in his place. He had risen from the dead! He was alive for ever and ever. Jesus' resurrection from the dead imparts **two spiritual certainties**. **First**, the resurrection is proof that we are declared "not guilty" in God's courtroom. Jesus has accomplished everything to make us right with God. We are at peace with God and our place in heaven is safe. **Second**, the resurrection is proof that we too will rise from the dead on the Last Day. Jesus will not leave us to rot in the grave, but will raise our bodies and make all things new. Until that great Day, Jesus is ruling all things in heaven and on earth for our good. He kept his promises and he will continue to keep them for us and our salvation.

Until that great Day, you and I also have some work to do on this earth. Christ Jesus has given us our job description as his followers: "Go and make disciples of all nations!" (Matthew 28:19). He wants us to share the message of Easter victory and the spiritual certainties. Just as the angels did long ago, now Christ calls on us to tell others: "Come and see what God has done for you!"

'Messenger ministry is what we love to do at First German. It's something we will continue to do, in order to "become all things to all people." (1 Corinthians 9:22).

At a special meeting of the congregation on March 14th we approved two moves to help us act as the angels did. We decided to call Jean Fischer to teach all-day kindergarten. God willing, we will reach more and more children with the message of Christ on a full-time basis. We also accepted an anonymous gift of \$20,000 to purchase the house at 702 Marshall Street. After meeting with the realtor, our offer was accepted (\$65,000) and a closing date has been set (April 5th). Our work as God's messengers to the world continues.

To help us carry out our work, we are encouraging a special campaign: **"Building God's Family Together... One House at a Time."** The goal of this campaign will be initially to open up the payment of the house at 702 Marshall Street to all members. If the Spirit of God moves you to give a gift toward paying off that house, feel free to give. 'To help with this ministry, please use the line on your envelopes marked "Other" and write "Building God's Family Together". So far gifts have been generously given. As good German Lutherans

there is one thing we do not like: *Schuld* (German for “debt”). Then as we turn our fiscal calendar to a new year in July, we will turn our attention to the big house we manage together: First German Evangelical Lutheran Church and School. This house needs our prayers and support as well. This is the most comprehensive way we are **“Building God’s Family Together... One House at a Time.”** We will be building God’s family here from the ground up with our new full day kindergarten. We will be strengthening homes and families as we serve them with God’s Word and Sacraments. We will be acting as angels, sharing good news with our children and the people of Manitowoc. Pray for the Lord Jesus to be with us. Pray for him to shape us—and he most certainly will!

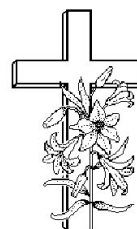

LETTER FROM LUTHER

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Let us reflect on the resurrection of our Lord Christ. It was not necessary for Christ to die for Himself, because He was born without sin and the devil had no claim on Him. Moreover, He was Lord over devil and death, so that the devil did not dare to attack Him. Christ might well have defied the devil and challenged him to touch one little hair of His head... No, we must view Him in this light, which this dying and rising again were for your benefit and mine. As He died and lay under the sod as you and I must die and be buried, thus He also rose again for our sakes and made an exchange with us; as He was brought into death through us, we shall be restored from death to life through Him. For by His death He has devoured our death, so that we all will also arise and live as He arose and lives. Therefore Christ is rightly called, “the Firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep” (1 Corinthians 15:20), since He takes the lead and draws the whole throng after Him. For whenever a first one is mentioned, it is implied that more than one are involved. The others who follow, the second, the third, and so forth, are included here, all bound together, as many as have fallen asleep. Otherwise, if Christ had risen alone and no one was to follow Him, He could not be called “the First”...

Behold, thus we must view our treasure and turn away from temporal reality which lies before our eyes and senses. We must not let death and other misfortune, distress and misery, terrify us so. Nor must we regard what the world has and can do, but balance this against what we are and have in Christ. For our confidence is built entirely on the fact that He has arisen and that we have life with Him already and are no longer in the power of death. Therefore let the world be mad and foolish, boasting of and relying on its money and goods; and let the devil rage with his poisonous darts in our conscience; and let him afflict us with all sorts of trouble—against all of this our one defiant boast shall be that Christ is our Firstfruits, that He has initiated the resurrection, that He has burst through the devil’s kingdom, through hell and death, that He no longer dies or sleeps but rules and reigns up above eternally, in order to rescue us, too, from this prison and death!

SIMPLY GIVING

Each year we ask you to prayerfully consider how the Lord has blessed you, and as a reflection of His love, prepare a written plan for how much you plan to give back to Him through your monetary offerings. Our written plan doesn’t always work out as planned. Life intervenes, and inevitably we miss a number of Sundays due to illness, vacation, or other things that are going on in our life. So the question is, do we always “double up” our offerings on the week following an absence? There is a very helpful tool available to help you meet your first-fruits financial commitment. It’s offered through Thrivent and is called “**Simply Giving.**” You decide the frequency and amount you would like to give, fill out a form with this information, and per your direction funds are automatically forwarded from your bank account to First German. It’s reliable and safe.

1. You can choose to direct your offering to specific areas of ministry. For example, if your weekly offering is \$100, you can specify that \$80 goes toward the general fund, \$10 to the building fund, and \$10 to missions.
2. You can discontinue or change the amount at any time.
3. You do not need to be a Thrivent member to participate.

What a simple way to ensure “first fruits” giving to the Lord! Currently, ten First German members use **Simply Giving**. If you are interested in signing up, simply fill out a form and put in mailbox #401. Forms are available by the guest register in the church lobby. MANITOWOC LUTHERAN HIGH SCHOOL

The MLHS Sunday Showcase was held on March 7th, and it turned out to be a huge success. Attendance was excellent, the food was very good, and everyone enjoyed the Christian fellowship and entertainment.

The proceeds raised from the Sunday Showcase will be used to replace the bleachers, which are no longer safe or up to code. They have no interior railings or designated walk-ways. There is no space for guests who use wheelchairs, walkers or strollers. The entire cost of the project is \$60,000 to \$70,000. A good portion of that amount was raised during Sunday Showcase. The Board of Control has authorized a supplemental fund drive to generate additional revenue to complete the project this summer. (After the bleachers are removed from the gym, some additional finishing work will be done on the gym floor also.) If anyone would like to donate money toward the bleacher project, every \$100 gift will cover the cost of one bleacher seat. Gifts of any amount are welcomed.

2010 – 2011 School Year projected enrollment:

- 47 – 9th Grade (that's about 53% of the 8th graders in our Lutheran Elementary Schools)
- 54 – 10th Grade
- 46 – 11th Grade
- 49 – 12th Grade
- 12 – International students
- 208 – Total estimated enrollment (2009 – 2010 enrollment is 206)

Throughout the course of the year, the students at MLHS have had opportunities to live their faith by participating in a number of service projects. The MLHS volleyball team and students from Reedsville raised over \$2,000 for the cancer program at an area hospital. The seniors in the National Honor Society (along with students from Brillion High School) collected 430 stuffed animals for children at both area hospitals and Children's Hospital of Milwaukee. The MLHS Student Council sponsored a collection of nonperishable food for Peter's Pantry in Manitowoc. The Varsity and JV basketball teams adopted two families from St. Marcus Congregation in Milwaukee for Christmas. They purchased gifts, wrapped them, and delivered them on December 20th. The National Honor Society and Student Council will travel to Georgia during Easter break to assist Builders for Christ, who are erecting a new WELS church there. Our students have many chances to "let their lights shine."

Lutheran High received a gift of real estate from an individual in our area. It is a residential lot on the north side of Manitowoc. A gift of \$5,000 was made by the same individual to cover the cost of any future sidewalk requirements.

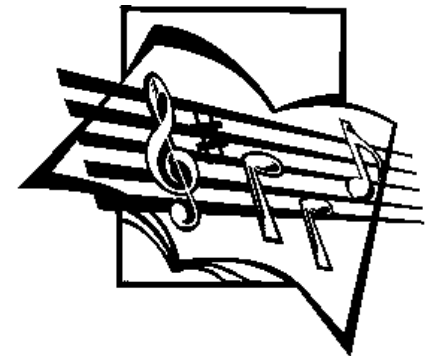
SCHOOL MUSIC

SYNOD NEWS

New Mission Congregations Planned

The Board for Home Missions (BHM) has announced that it is moving forward with efforts to establish two new home mission congregations and to expand the outreach efforts in two other locations. One new mission congregation will be established in Castle Rock, Colo. Another, which will concentrate on outreach among the Hmong community, will be established in Kansas City, Kan. In addition, Santo Tomas in Phoenix, Ariz., will receive a second pastor in order to expand its outreach among the Hispanic community. Living Savior in Asheville, N.C., will be provided funding for a second pastor to expand its outreach efforts and to work toward establishing other congregations in the rapidly growing area.

Synod Salaries Frozen For A Second Year

The BHM's action follows the Synodical Council's (SC) Feb. 27 decision to freeze the salaries of all synodical workers at the current level. (Note: the freeze was not fully reported in the last edition of "Together" to allow time for affected workers to be notified first.) The SC approved the freeze because of the potential shortfall in funding for the next fiscal year, which begins in July. This shortfall may occur because of the anticipated reduction in gifts from the Schwan Foundation and because commitments from congregations are lower than what was anticipated. This is the second consecutive year in which salaries have not been increased.

While the mission expansion and salary freeze may appear inconsistent, keep in mind all of the BHM initiatives are being carried out within the established and approved synod budget and in keeping with previous plans of the Board for Home Missions. With the salary freeze, the SC acted in keeping with a resolution passed by the 2009 convention. That resolution directed the SC to maintain current compensation levels before making any further reduction in the mission and ministry programs of the synod. The convention preferred that this should be done with unpaid furloughs (rather than a salary freeze), but the SC was informed that the logistics of implementing furloughs would be unmanageable and impractical. The SC followed the intent of the convention by reducing compensation costs before reducing ministry programs.

Also, an important aspect of the SC decision was a provision that the salaries could be unfrozen in the future if sufficient financial resources become available. An increase in giving (beyond what is now projected) would make possible the reinstatement of the modest planned salary increase.

He Lives!
